CURRICULUM

We deliver a rigorous, challenging curriculum designed to teach how to effectively respond to the demands of today's diverse schools. The curriculum emphasizes pedagogical excellence, scholarship and best practices. We strive to empower students with the confidence and skilled ability to impact classrooms.

PRACTICUM/FIELD EXPERIENCES

Practicum and field experiences are embedded in certain core education courses to ensure classroom learning coexists with hands-on experiences. Students will observe a classroom and assist with tasks, assignments, lesson planning and more. GCU has counselors that help students with self-placement, professor placement and/or public, private, charter or faith-based school settings.

STUDENT TEACHING

Programs that lead to initial teacher licensure within the College of Education culminate with the teacher candidates completing the student teaching experience in a classroom setting. Taken at the conclusion of all coursework, student teaching requires 15–16 weeks (dependent upon the teacher candidate's program of study). During this time, teacher candidates are mentored by an approved cooperating teacher and are expected to assume all teaching responsibilities – such as lesson planning, delivery of lessons, grading, etc. – needed to teach students safely and effectively. Teacher candidates may choose to complete their student teaching requirement in their home state, allowing the opportunity to teach in their desired district/school site before and after graduation.

DEGREE PROGRAMS

The College of Education offers a wide variety of degree programs that provide a premier educational experience designed to prepare students to graduate equipped with effective teaching methods, as well as expertise in their respective content areas (English, history, mathematics, etc.).

Elementary Education

This degree prepares teachers to tailor content, instruction and projects that meet diverse student needs and interests. Other job responsibilities include motivating and engaging students, establishing behavioral rules and communicating with parents.

Early Childhood Education

Graduates of this early childhood education bachelor's degree will be highly qualified to teach birth through third grade and work as preschool teachers and daycare providers. This bachelor's degree curriculum includes instructional strategies, teaching methodologies, assessment techniques, theories of early childhood growth and development and the impact of family and cultural diversity on early childhood.

Elementary and Special Education (Dual Major)

The curriculum for this degree includes both pedagogical knowledge and special education-specific content. Graduates of the program are prepared to work with students with mild to moderate disabilities through implementing individualized educational plans to accommodate students' various learning, behavioral and social needs.

Early Childhood and Special Education (Dual Major)

This dual bachelor's degree combines the specializations of early childhood education and special education. Teacher candidates explore the education of children with and without exceptionalities, as well as concepts of child, family and community collaboration and advocacy.

Educational Studies

This degree prepares graduates to work toward a brighter future by influencing educational policies, laws, programs and curricula. Students taking this program will critically examine and analyze pedagogical theories, teaching practices, education laws and learning environments.

English for Secondary Education

This degree program prepares aspiring English teachers to meet the challenges of the modern secondary education classroom. Graduates who successfully complete state certification requirements will be qualified to teach students in grades 6-12. This degree program is a joint initiative of GCU's College of Education and the College of Humanities and Social Sciences.

History for Secondary Education

High school history teachers do more than teach facts, events and dates—they impart ethical standards and wisdom developed over centuries of human history. Students take coursework that aligns with the requirements established by the National Council for Social Studies (NCSS).

Mathematics for Secondary Education

This degree program prepares aspiring math teachers to pursue a career inspiring and educating adolescent learners. Graduates will be prepared to use critical thinking and general problem-solving skills to tackle difficulties within any field and to help their own students to do the same. This degree program is a joint initiative of GCU's College of Education and the College of Humanities and Social Sciences.

Biology for Secondary Education

The need for teachers in the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) field is greater than ever. This degree is designed to provide future middle school and high school teachers with the content knowledge they need to be successful biology teachers. In addition to the biology teaching degree, graduates can earn initial teacher licensure.

Physical Education

This physical education degree is ideal for teacher candidates who possess an enduring love of sports, physical fitness and wellness. Physical education (PE) teachers can serve as powerful role models and motivators for the next generation as they model how to make healthy choices and reach one's full potential in the PreK-12 grade school setting.

STUDENT WORK AND INTERNSHIPS

ARIZONA STUDENT TEACHING INTERN CERTIFICATE (ASTIC)

The Arizona Student Teaching Intern Certificate is available to eligible candidates who have secured a contract with a district and are currently enrolled in the student teaching capstone experience of one of the eligible licensure programs. This exciting and unique opportunity is made available to qualified teacher candidates who are looking for compensation during student teaching. Our alumni attribute their success in the ASTIC to the number of embedded practicum/field experiences that are included in the applicable programs of study. Some students may choose to continue in the same district or school after the completion of their student teaching.

CANYON GLOBAL EDUCATORS

Students who qualify for this opportunity may enhance their academic and practical experiences by taking part in teaching and learning experiences abroad. Our advisors are available to share the advantages of joining our Canyon Global Educators program, as well as information regarding possible locations. In this program, students gain educational perspectives and develop a global, multicultural mindset.



STUDENT SUPPORT SYSTEMS

FIELD EXPERIENCE COUNSELOR (FEC)

Field Experience Counselors (FEC) are dedicated to helping education students through the practicum process through placement assistance. These counselors are also well informed and specialize in preparing students to apply for their teaching license wherever they plan to teach after graduation.

TEACHER PLACEMENT COUNSELOR (TPC)

The Teacher Placement Counselor (TPC) is a crucial component to a student's pursuit of the location and expectations for their student teaching. Students may choose to complete their student teaching in Arizona, in their home state or internationally.

PLEDGE AND PROMISE

Pledge and Promise is an assistance program that any education alumni can take advantage of while they are working as an educator. Alumni can simply contact the College of Education to receive a refresher course or mentorship. This is the way that the College of Education provides support to teachers who are changing the world from their classrooms.

RESCUE SUBSTITUTES

GCU students can apply for an Emergency Substitute Certificate in the state of Arizona and further prepare themselves for the teaching field by becoming rescue substitutes. This opportunity allows students to fulfill their practicum hours in the classroom while also being paid as a substitute. GCU's College of Education is doing our part to help solve the substitute shortage while preparing students to change the world with their impact in the classroom.



ON-CAMPUS FACILITIES AND STUDENT RESOURCES

MODEL CLASSROOM

This space is used for many methods courses. Faculty and students can use this space as a "mock" classroom to better mirror what they may see in a PreK-12 classroom space with manipulatives, a horseshoe table and touchscreen technology. Students will conduct a number of lessons or "teach outs" where they have to model their own lessons in front of peers and faculty in this space.

MULTICULTURAL LIBRARY

The Multicultural Library is a community-driven space where faculty and students explore diverse texts when creating lesson plans. Faculty bring classes to the library to explore the texts for research purposes, lesson planning development and the examination of diversity in literature.



LOPES LEAP TO TEACH

Lopes Leap to Teach is a College of Education networking initiative launched in December 2014 to help Arizona school districts connect with qualified teachers. Districts and schools from across the state visit GCU's campus to present features of each school's culture, curriculum, diverse programs and available resources. Through relationship building during these events, teacher candidates can learn more about each district and school for potential practicum hours, student teaching requests and future employment.

¹ Travel reimbursement is only available to accepted prospective traditional campus students, plus one legal guardian, from a student's home city/state to Phoenix, AZ. School/district/organizations staff, faculty and/or personnel are also eligible. To participate, the program requires a signed MOU by both the student and parent/guardian or personnel, approval of travel dates by GCU and receipts submitted per GCU requirements. Travel reimbursement thresholds vary based on location and education sector. Only one form of travel will be reimbursed, air OR ground. GCU does not reimburse hotel expenses, baggage costs, early check-in or travel insurance fees. Travel reimbursement usually occurs within 45 days.
