6. ONE APPLICATION:

Many colleges and universities have implemented additional measures of evaluation before permitting upperclassmen to complete their major course of study. Secondary acceptance requires an additional application, a second review of previously submitted materials and/or a minimum GPA requirement. These secondary measures can potentially delay graduation and incur greater expense. At GCU, most incoming students are accepted into their program of study without a secondary review, with the exception of our nursing and athletic training programs, which require secondary acceptance due to clinical restrictions.

PREPARATION FOR THE WORKFORCE ▼

A degree from the College of Humanities and Social Sciences gives students social, intellectual and problem-solving skills needed for a thriving career. Research continues to support that industry leaders want employees who can communicate well, understand others and are highly adaptable to learn new information in the age of lifelong learning, expansion and rapid development. Additionally, we prepare students for the workforce through our capstone courses offered in many of our programmatic areas. The capstone course allows students to create a tangible project (research, proposal, community service, etc.) that can be utilized during a job interview to show employers that our students have the skill set needed for the workforce.

PREPARATION FOR GRADUATE STUDIES ▼

Our degree programs prime students to continue their education by moving onto graduate school. Students are prepared for graduate school entrance exams through faculty-led LSAT sessions, which help students feel confident about moving onto law school and various graduate programs. Our robust portfolio of master's and doctoral-level degree programs align with our undergraduate degree programs. These programs are also set up with many open general education and elective credits for students to diversify their collegiate experience through double majors or the addition of minors. Doing so increases a student's knowledge base and allows them to gain experience in more than one programmatic area and increase employability.

COMMUNICATIONS/HUMANITIES

Our humanities programs teach students the skills needed to go into many communication-oriented professions including public relations. These professionals work to maintain the relationship between the general public and specific individuals, organizations and corporations.

COUNSELING

A counselor has the opportunity to be a positive force for clients and help them achieve a better quality of life. Counselors may work with diverse clientele such as children and married couples in mental health and substance abuse settings.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE

The criminal justice field is an engaging field to pursue. Most criminal justice careers do not require graduate-level degrees and the field is holding steady with employment growth for all occupations.

HISTORY

History is a growing industry with an increase in employment across many positions. History majors may also pursue many careers including archivists, curators and museum technicians and conservators.

LAW

Aspiring lawyers love data, factual arguments and constructing messaging to sway others. Law is an excellent field to move into! Positions include traditional lawyers, paralegals, legal assistants and more.

PROFESSIONAL WRITING

There are numerous ways to pursue a career in English. Our college especially focuses on preparing students for careers in technical writing, a promising and exciting field.

PSYCHOLOGY

Many areas of psychology beyond traditional psychology, including as sports, industrial, organizational and forensic psychology are expanding and offering an even wider variety of job opportunities.

SOCIAL WORK

Behavioral Health *and* Social Sciences

Explore the mind and human behavior with a social-science degree

THEORY-FOCUSED SOCIAL SCIENCE DEGREES:

PSYCHOLOGY

Gain insight into human behavior and interaction by examining how personality and cognitive thinking form, develop and influence a person's social and cultural environment. Students learn from a science-based curriculum aligned with the American Psychological Association. This program builds knowledge of human behavior through studying results, scientific observation, data collection and analysis.

- **Potential Careers:*** Welfare or social services case manager, entry-level community behavioral worker or a human resource specialist
- **Potential Fields:** Industrial and organizational, forensic, behavioral, clinical and pediatric psychology, as well as counseling and mental health fields
- Students may also pursue graduate-level education in the psychological, counseling and/or mental health fields

SOCIOLOGY

Examine the impact of society on human social interactions and its influence on human behavior and cultural diversity. This program provides a strong foundation of scientific research with a focus on race, gender and income inequality. It also fosters critical thinking, servant leadership, investigative research and the development of analytical and collaborative skills.

At GCU, we offer the social work emphasis to provide students with foundational social work knowledge that focuses on human behavior and the social environment, case management and direct practice. Students interested in clinical social work will need to pursue a master's in social work and obtain licensure.

- **Potential Careers:** Social worker, case management aide, child welfare worker, youth services provider, recreational therapist, grassroots/human rights organizer, community relations specialist, community health educator, data analyst, employment specialist or research consultant

SKILL-FOCUSED SOCIAL SCIENCE DEGREES:

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SCIENCE

Students develop a general and broader perspective on areas within behavioral health concepts, impacts of culture and diversity, use of information technology and the importance of a professional network. This program teaches students about both counseling skills and theories of sociology/psychology. Behavioral health sciences address human development, abnormal psychology, probability and statistics, counseling theories and ethical conviction.

- **Potential Careers:** Behavioral health technician, including a mental health service technician, social and community service manager or case manager
- Students may pursue graduate-level education in the psychological, counseling and/or mental health fields

COUNSELING

Learn to serve and provide the best care for individuals and families affected by drug dependency. Students engage in counseling theories and techniques for gathering and assessing behavioral information for implementing solutions to help victims in recovery. This program focuses on addiction and treatment, family dynamics, methods to halt destructive behavior and relapse prevention, crisis intervention skills and case management.

- **Potential Careers:** Substance abuse technician working in a private practice, rehab clinic or a mental health center
- The program leads to Licensed Substance Abuse Technician licensure

PUBLIC SERVICE

Lead in law enforcement, public service or government administration

GOVERNMENT WITH AN EMPHASIS IN LEGAL STUDIES

Examine both the broad philosophical view of law, including the Christian perspective, and practical coursework in criminal and civil law. Students can prepare for a career in government or the private sector with a special focus on law through an examination of constitutional questions, ethical issues, logical thought and real-world applications.

- **Potential Careers:** Paralegal or in an administrative role (special focus is provided for students preparing for the Law School Admission Test)

GOVERNMENT WITH AN EMPHASIS IN STATE AND LOCAL PUBLIC POLICY

Explore the scope of governance and democracy through patterns of political behavior and effectively use this data to affect positive change. This program references political and socioeconomic environments, as well as strategies for government administration and public policy development at national, state and local levels. An understanding of government affairs and development of municipal government supports leadership and service for the public.

- **Potential Careers:** Public administrator or research and budget analyst, or a job in a professional setting such as a nonprofit, regulatory affairs in the private sector and the corporate space that is heavily reliant on public policy and regulation

JUSTICE STUDIES

Learn the foundations of America's legal system, law enforcement, criminology and how to ensure the fair and just treatment of community members. Study constitutional law, statutory law, case law interpretation, policing and criminological research and how each impacts the legal system.

- **Ideal for students interested in:** Policing, investigation, corrections, case management, strategic planning, regulatory compliance, licensing, contract review and cybercrime
- **Potential Careers:** Police officer, parole officer, corrections officer or as a professional in settings such as government, investigative organizations, public service agencies and private legal practice

COMMUNICATIONS

Students develop skills to construct messages, as well as learn common characteristics of effective communication and contextual factors that influence individuals personally and professionally. Explore principles and best practices of communication exchanges, interpersonal and organizational communications, public relations fundamentals and ethical decision making.

- **Potential Careers:** Broadcaster, technical writer or editor, public relations specialist, corporate trainer, campaign manager, account executive, sales representative, human resources coordinator and training/development specialist

ENGLISH FOR SECONDARY EDUCATION

Become a certified English teach with a specialization in secondary education who's qualified to teach students in grades five through 12. Core domains include the learner and learning, application of content, instructional practice and professional responsibility. Students will learn the skills to lead in the modern classroom, from excellent communication and critical thinking skills to the comprehension and practical application of methodologies and classroom techniques.

- **Potential Careers:** Middle/high school English, ESP or special education teacher, as well as private tutor, standardized test developer, school administrator, education consultant and museum educator

ENGLISH WITH AN EMPHASIS IN PROFESSIONAL WRITING

Students focus on core competencies of literature and informational texts, rhetoric, composition and professional writing. This program focuses on the development of advanced writing, enriched critical thinking and analysis skills, while students enhance their understanding of the English language as a whole.

- **Potential Careers:** Grant writing, technical writing, scientific writing, copywriting, social media writing, public relations and journalism

Humanities

Turn your passion for history or Spanish into a meaningful career

HISTORY

Students deepen their understanding of societal development and structures through the evaluation of historical research, global civilizations, social conflict and change. This degree engages the discipline thematically, providing a contemporary alternative to chronological study. Students learn about the political, economic and social aspects of war and revolutions. Additionally, they will identify patterns of human action and violence while covering intellectual and religious developments over time.

- **Potential Careers:** Business management, mass communication, policymaking, government public service and teaching

HISTORY FOR SECONDARY EDUCATION

Approved by the Arizona State Board of Education, this program is an opportunity for those to pursue a career path that connects a passion for history and education. Coursework is also aligned with the requirements established by the National Council for Social Studies (NCSS). A thematic approach to learning allows for an exploration of historical contexts that are both in-depth and broad in scope.

- **Potential Careers:** Public or private school administrator, museum educator or archivist, private tutor, standardized test developer, education consultant, history textbook writer, content strategist and documentary writer or editor

MATHEMATICS FOR SECONDARY EDUCATION

The BS in Mathematics in Secondary Education is designed for students seeking initial licensure and preparing for a career as a secondary education teacher in a high-demand field. Teacher candidates will obtain a wealth of knowledge in the mathematics content areas like algebra, calculus and geometry and learn to apply these concepts in the classroom.

- **Potential Careers:** Public or private administrator, analyst, researcher, standardized test developer, education consultant and math textbook writer content

SPANISH

Students learn basic language and conversation skills, including the development of listening, reading, writing and speaking skills. They build upon that foundation, learning to apply grammar, expand vocabulary and give attention to the Spanish culture. This program further focuses on developing the ability to use language to understand cultural differences, as students engage in theory and methodology necessary to perform professional duties.

- **Potential Careers:** Interpreter or translator

Immersing Students in Spanish Culture

The Spanish program exposes students to food, music, literature and other cultural experiences to learn fully. Spanish students have an opportunity to travel to Nogales, a border town, to experience different dialects and accents, meet with an immigration social worker and increase their understanding of the relationship between Mexico and the United States. Students will also enjoy authentic meals during their experience.

SPEECH AND DEBATE

GCU's nationally ranked* Speech and Debate team won four titles at the Pacific Southwest Collegiate Forensic Association Fall Champions—earning the team its best finish in history. Competitor Tommee Gleason was also awarded as a Top Overall Speaker at the national championship. Coached by Michael Dvorak, the Speech and Debate team strengthens debaters' public speaking skills and provides them with hands-on, real world experience.

The team travels all over the country debating and speaking on a wide variety of topics. Through developing communication skills, students understand how to respond to difficult questions with tact and poise while becoming more versed in current events. Furthermore, students that demonstrate a commitment to the program can earn scholarships and job recommendations.

The Speech and Debate team competes in 11 different speech events and one debate. Students can expect to become more versed in worldly affairs, improve argumentation skills and enhance their verbal delivery skills while learning from a dedicated and competitive coaching staff.
